

Retrospective: Forty Years of Photography *by Daniel Dempster*

Daniel Dempster is a freelance photographer who has been creating photographs for over forty years. His images are regularly used in corporate reports, in major newspapers and magazines, and for consumer products worldwide.

His professional start came when he was asked to be the official photographer for the Kentucky Derby Festival in 1989 and for which he has won several international awards. He has also published six coffee-table books, one of which won the Ben Franklin Award for best large format book in 2005.

Daniel enjoys teaching and has spent many years as a workshop instructor and photographic tour guide. Daniel makes his home in the rolling hills of southern Indiana with his wife Denise.

SANP Field Events with Dale Potter

A few changes are being made in Field Events for the coming year. For field events that occur in the Smokies, there will be a limit on attendance. This limit is due to the crowds in the park and limited parking. Due to this change, if you sign up for a field event and cannot attend, please change your reservation or email the leader of that field event so they can change your reservation. You may be limited to bringing guests to events that are held in the Smokies for this reason.

Carpooling will be used for some of the events in the Smokies. Carpooling may occur outside of the Smokies to limit how many parking spots we may require. While most field events have allowed individuals to leave as they needed, due to the changes about limiting vehicles, you may have to stay longer than you prefer. There may be some events in the Smokies at dusk or dark that the number of those attending will increase but that will be due to the events requiring walking to the locations for the photographing.

For field events held outside of the Smokies, the number of individuals allowed to attend will be determined by the event and location. Some field events will be limited to members only to ensure members have

first preference. Your cooperation is needed by registering for the field events you intend to attend. Please do not show up unannounced at an event you did not register for. While we have been tolerant of allowing this to happen in the past, due to limitations you need to go online and register. If an event is full, then do not show up unless you have cleared it with the leader of the field event.

There may be occasions where there are two field events, a field event, or a focus session on the same

date and time frame. Don't fret. Instead, be excited that there is more than one option, and you are

required to make a choice. There will be no field events scheduled on any date where there is a paid workshop, even if that workshop is sold out. Workshops will always have priority for our members.



Leaders are needed for field events. If you are a parking lot photographer, others would be willing to join you if you are willing to lead the event. If you are a social photographer that wants to have breakfast before, lunch, or dinner afterward, others will join you if you lead that event. If you are a hiker, backpacker, or camper and want to lead a field event, you may discover that others will join you if you plan the event. There are plenty of opportunities for field event leaders if you will step forward and lead the event. There is free training on how to use the website. May 2024 Photography Challenge with Ron McConathy

Mark your calendars for the next SANP Photography Challenge on Saturday, May 4th at the Gupton Wetlands in TVA's Lakeshore Park in Harriman TN.

The purpose of this challenge is to create photographs of nature subjects at the Gupton Wetlands. Emphasis should be placed on showing the animals, plants, or scenics as the main subject. Photographs can be made at this location any time on 4 May 2024 between sunrise and sunset. Shorebirds, waterfowl, and herons and egrets are common at this site. A paved walking trail stretches .75 miles along the edge of the wetlands. Photographers can also walk a mile along the power lines north of the paved trail. There are a number of websites listed when you search for Gupton Wetlands and they have additional information.

This challenge is for SANP members and registration by May 2nd is required. Criteria for the competition can be found on the Events page on the SANP website <u>here</u>.




